BACK TO BUSINESS ON WILDLIFE DRIVE

here was good news. And then that other kind. Wildlife Drive repaving and improvements had finished on time for an October 1, 2013, grand re-opening. Bikers and motorists alike collected at the front gate, eager for their first glimpse since mid-May.

Unfortunately, earlier that morning the federal government lowered the boom: A government shutdown that meant Wildlife Drive and all of the Refuge would ultimately remain closed for 16 days. Happily, the Drive is once again accessible and rave reviews keep coming in. The project included water structure improvements and expanded parking at Calusa Shell Mound Trail.

Register today to attend the second annual "Ding" Darling Trailgate Party on February 21, 2014, and get ready for another one-of-a-kind evening and the event of the season.


With a portion of event proceeds going to support continued mangrove cuckoo research and other education and research efforts at the Refuge, the theme this year is "In the Pink," in homage to "Ding's" iconic bird, the Roseate Spoonbill.

Last year's inaugural "Cuckoo for 'Ding'" Trailgate Party took its theme from the Mangrove Cuckoo research study being conducted at the Refuge the past couple of years.

"So the Roseate Spoonbill will be the second of our Big 5 birds," said Birgie Vertesch, Executive Director of the "Ding" Darling Wildlife Society, which hosts the event.

The Trailgate Party will take place at the Refuge and include live entertainment and silent and live auctions to provide Refuge support where government funding falls short.

"In Southwest Florida, we have a calendar chock full of community events, but the 'Ding' Trailgate Party continued on page 7

Because of parking squeezes during the busy winter and spring seasons, the Refuge and Tarpon Bay Explorers have devised a new strategy for visitors who are taking the tram tour of Wildlife Drive during the January-April time frame. 

Photo Contest Winners

DWS announced the winners of its 26th annual "Ding" Darling Days Amateur Nature Photography Contest on October 26, 2013, at a special Conservation Art Day presentation during "Ding" Darling Days.

Judges had selected 13 winners out of 74 entries from 19 states and four countries. All photographs entered were shot at the Refuge.

First place went to Michael Dougherty of Clarkston, Michigan, for his Green Heron at Sunrise image. "I was torn between it and the Yellow-Crowned Night Heron [that took third place]," said judge Laura Ball, a local professional artist. "I loved the contrasts in color in this one — how the leaves brought out the orange color in the bird's neck."

Craig Goettsch from Colorado Springs, Colo., took second place with a photo of a Reddish Egret doing its fishing "dance."

"The color balance is beautiful and the composition exceptionally good," said David Lee, a visiting photographer from England, who stepped in to judge for a Refuge

Boardwalk Complete

The three winners received cash awards from DDWS at the presentation. The winning photographs and 10 honorable mention award entries will be on display in the Refuge Education Center throughout the year.

\$10K Grant for 'Ding'

less Shelton, DDWS Associate Director of Community Outreach and Development, and Supervisory Refuge Ranger Toni Westland recently accepted a check for \$10,000 from Carolyn Gora, a representative of the Southwest Florida Community Foundation Arts and Marketing Committee. DDWS will use the funds to support the Refuge's 2014 free summer educational programs.



In past years, the Refuge has been growing a summer program that began in 2008 with three activities. Last summer, it offered families such programs as "Oh Scat & Animal Tracks," "Natural Wonders," and "Reading at the Refuge."

"Our federal government budget covers very little of the expenses involved in staffing and providing supplies for these programs," said Supervisory Refuge Ranger Toni Westland. "We have relied on our wonderful Friends group in years past, and are so grateful to get this boost from the Community Foundation."

"We're looking into bringing in a special traveling exhibit this summer with some of the grant funds to enhance the visitor's experience as well as to educate and inspire wildlife protection," said Birgie Vertesch, DDWS executive director. "It's partners such as this that make possible wonderful opportunities to inspire minds toward the conservation of Mother Earth. We can't thank them enough."





Farewell To a Guiding Friend

Christopher 'Kip' Koss, 1935-2013

With utmost sorrow, we bid farewell to one of the Refuge's dearest friends and supporters, the grandson of Jay Norwood Darling himself, Christopher "Kip" Koss. Kip, like his grandfather before him, had a long, affectionate relationship with these islands and their natural treasures.

He founded the "Ding" Darling Foundation to keep alive the memories of his highly accomplished grand-father. When it disbanded, he disbursed funds between the "Ding" Darling Wildlife Society and Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation (SCCF) to be used for conservation education.

Kip Koss first visited Captiva and Sanibel in 1937 with his parents, Mary & Dick Koss, and his grandfather, Jay N. "Ding" Darling. As a youngster he grew up in the company of such legends as Andy & Dessa Rossi, Grace Price (the founder of 'Tween Waters Inn), Dottie Wakefield (Grace's daughter), Belton Johnson, Alice O'Brien, Max and Jeannie Hayford, and Old Man Futch of Buck Key.

In the early years, before Captiva and Sanibel roads

were paved, Kip, his parents and his grandparents all stayed at 'Tween Waters. There were no telephones on either island, the bridge across Blind Pass consisted of a rickety wooden bridge that was one-way for two reasons: There wasn't room for two cars to pass on the bridge, and the bridge's strength could only stand the weight of one vehicle at a time. A truck passing over the bridge was a breath-holding event.

Kip's children and grandchildren meet annually at 'Tween Waters, where dinner at the Old Captiva House is a nightly opportunity to recap the day's events. Kayakers compare their adventures with manatees and crabs in the mangroves, while early beachcombers proudly display the morning's treasures, and photographers boast of the daily sightings. There's something for everyone, and Kip has had the pleasure of sharing his childhood experiences with two more generations who have learned the value of legacy from one of the island's legends.

Kip has worked closely with the "Ding" Darling Wildlife Society and its board through the years to keep alive the memory and important work of his grandfather. He visited often from his home on Key Biscayne in Miami. We will miss him dearly.

Teacher Grants

DWS Education Committee members and science and media teachers from across Lee County gathered recently on the Refuge's new Wildlife Education Boardwalk to distribute and receive \$5,000 in grant monies to fund conservation-related school projects for the 2013-2014 school year. To date, we have awarded

nearly \$40,000 in teacher grants.

Next year the grant program will expand to \$10,000 and a five-county area, including Lee, Charlotte, Collier, Hendry, and Glades counties.
